Greetings Families of Deer Park,

Spring...here we come! Although it feels like winter mostly missed us this year, spring is officially just around the corner! I would like to thank everyone who attended our Black History Month events. Over two hundred people were in attendance. Our Blacks in Wax presentation provided information about famous African Americans and the performance showcased our students' talents as they highlighted the Historically Black Colleges and Universities experience. We received nothing but positive feedback from our families.

Looking ahead, Deer Park will have a Music in our Schools concert this month. We will be featuring our first and third grade students and Music Makers Club in this performance. The performance will be on Tuesday, March 19th, at 6:30 p.m. Look for a flyer in this edition of the newsletter.

We would like to encourage parents to help their children succeed in school by attending school regularly. School success goes hand in hand with good attendance. Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school. Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read. Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks. Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school and themselves. Building this habit from the very beginning of preschool will instill right away that going to school on time, every day, is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work. Please be sure your children attend school every day and complete all assignments daily.

We would also lie to encourage our parents to refrain from picking up students for early dismissal. Our school day ends at 3:20 p.m. Students are engaged in instruction until the 3:15 bell rings. Picking your child up from school early causes them to miss valuable instruction as well as the formative assessment at the end of the lesson. If possible, please have your child complete the entire school day.

We are at the half-way mark of the third quarter. If your child is in danger of failing a subject or has dropped a letter grade, you should have received an email or phone call from their teacher. Please have a conversation with your child and develop a plan to ensure that they bring the grade up before the end of the quarter. You may also visit your child's Schoology page and review their grades.

Lots of positive things have been happening at Deer Park over the past month.

At the end of the second quarter, we held our PEACE Celebration to honor those students who had demonstrated two or more of the PEACE traits. Those students participated in our Hungry Hippos activity.





In February we challenged the students to look for the PEACE traits they see in the students in their classes. To aid in that effort we introduced the **Positivity Potato**.

Greetings Pre-K Families!

It is already the third quarter, and the Pre-K children are doing beautifully. Please continue to read to your child. At this age, children enjoy dramatizing stories. Not only is this great fun, but it also deepens a child's awareness of story structure. Acting out stories introduces young learners to elements of stories such as characters, setting and the sequence of events. Making predictions when a book is read for the first time helps children to make sense of what is being shown through the illustrations as well as the words. Consider ways to stretch the story by encouraging your child to draw his/her favorite part of the story. Invite your child to explain what he/ she would do if he/she were a character in the story!

Look what's happening in Kindergarten



Spring is just around the corner!! The students have been doing a great job with buttoning and zippering their coats. It is important for all children to be dressed appropriately for the outdoors and dismissal in the cold and wet weather. We encourage independence and proficiency in kindergarten with the self-help skills listed below. We appreciate your help. Thanks!

- Putting on and taking off jackets (if sleeves are wrong side out, children need to learn how to pull the sleeves right-side out)
- Zipping, buttoning, snapping
- Tying shoes
- · Managing own backpack and folder
- Taking care of bathroom needs
- Using and properly disposing of facial tissues

MATH

This semester we will continue working on number sense, number formation, and counting. Children are learning about 2D and 3D shapes, writing the numerals 0-20, counting by 1's to 100, and counting by 10's to 100. Kindergartners are also learning how to read the numbers from 0-50 when they are in random order. We will continue to work on generating and continuing patterns. Other topics we will explore this month are, simple addition and subtraction number stories, graphing, probability, one to one counting, comparing size, and simple measurement.

LITERACY NEWS

All kindergartners are developing fluency in letter naming, initial sounds, phoneme segmentation, and reading short vowel words. We will begin to introduce long vowels this month. These activities are practiced daily during phonics instruction. All of the students continue to receive daily reading instruction planned according to their instructional needs. Please continue to reinforce your child's sight word recognition by practicing daily!

READING AT HOME

As your child enters the wonderful world of reading, share in the enthusiasm and excitement by reading to him or her regularly. Your child will treasure those special times together, and you will be helping him or her become familiar with the sounds of the English language. Use the following tips as you read aloud and share favorite stories with your child.

- Select stories both you and your child will enjoy, such as those pertaining to a favorite hobby or sport. Include silly rhymes, chants and tongue twisters for extra fun.
- Encourage your child to predict what comes next by looking at pictures or listening to word clues. For example, Jack and Jill went up the _____.
- Point out letter sounds in words as you read. Highlight words that have a specific phonetic sound, such as those that contain the /b/ sound. Have your child identify rhyming words aloud as you point to them in the story.
- Listen for rhyming words. Have your child think of additional words with the same sound patterns.
- Dramatize your voice as you read. Your child will delight in hearing the words "come to life". Take turns reading different parts and invite your child to act out each role as you share stories aloud.





Hello from the Fabulous First Grade Hall!

Our First Graders are awesome! Every day they inspire us with their humor, determination, and kindness! Please remind your scholar that everyone plays a part in creating a warm, welcoming, and safe environment for learning.

Currently we are working hard on our seventh module in ELA, The Great Outdoors. Watch us grow -identifying main topics, supporting details, and information about some familiar and some novel places in our world. We will be researching the weather, researching, and creating our own informational piece to teach!

In Math we are working on Unit 6, Figure the Facts with Penguins. We are working on becoming proficient with story problems, adding, subtracting, and counting by sets of tens, fives, and twos. We are using the open number line as a strategy to solve problems. This month we joined our older grade levels as we begin to take our unit assessment for math online through Performance Matters. Ms. Thurston held her first Fluency contest in February, and we are gearing up for our March Match Up to hold onto the Math Champion Poster for another month!

We concluded our second Science unit and our second Health unit. Now it is back to Social Studies as we examine our local community here in Baltimore. We will look at the economics, geography, culture, and traditions of our own county.

Please make sure all First Grade scholars are practicing high frequency words daily and rereading the decodables sent home each week. Remember to read every night and bring those Book Buddy Bags each day! Homework is given every day and should be returned each morning. All work should be headed with first and last name and the date!

Our first Field Trip is coming soon. We are looking for lots of chaperones. If you are interested, please go online to do the BCPS chaperone training.


